Affordable internet for families

Spark Jump helps families and whānau get home broadband so children can learn online at home.

It's a low-cost, pre-pay internet service for families with children under 18, with no current broadband connection. No contract or credit check is needed.

They attend a 2-hour workshop and we send them home with a modem and 30GB of data. When this data has run out, or expires in 30 days, they can purchase another 30GB for \$10.

Our first workshop is already fully booked with the next ones filling fast.

The Construction of the Mangahau Dam during the decade between 1920—29 was a crucial time in the history of Shannon. To help preserve these memories the Friends of Horowhenua libraries will donate \$2000.00 to assist with the digitization of the Shannon News from 1920—1929 as part of the Papers Past project. In the past we have assisted funding of the digitization of the Levin Chronicle. We have now gone as far as allowed under copyright laws with that paper so now it is the turn of other local papers.
