## ***What a great booksale!***

We spent the afternoon of Sunday 8th July setting out a selection of books for sale—there are so many wonderful treasures in the collection and it was easy to get side tracked when titles of personal interests were on show.

The stock on sale was a mixture of donated books from generous local people as well as cancelled library stock.

Libraries need to cancel books for many reasons. Many of the books on sale had obviously been well loved and had served their time as library books. Once books look shabby and unappealing they tend not to be issued out as often, and just serve to take up valuable shelf space, making it

necessary to weed out and cancel them. Others which may look pristine and unmarked are also weeded out—if they are not worn it's obvious that they are not being used and are therefore taking up space that a harder working title could occupy.

All stock that is weeded for potential cancelling is checked against the database to see if it is still relevant, whether it is still in demand, or whether (in the case of seriously worn titles) it is worth replacing with a new edition.

Since we cannot expand our library walls, shelf space is at a premium and in order to keep the collection fresh and relevant cancellations are inevitable.

There are always new publications in demand and we are truly fortunate that our librarians respond to our demands to supply these. *(Did you know that you can make recommendations for purchase of titles you think would enhance the library collection?)*.



But we are lucky that we always have the opportunity to acquire old favourites for ourselves at the library book sales. The only problem that I have, is that if I donate a few titles to the sale in order to tidy up my own collection, I am just as likely to acquire twice as many at the sale to bring home with me!

**Orokohanga – the beginning of the world** - is an art exhibition that celebrates and explores the Māori stories and teachings about the way the world was created. It will lead you on a journey through the beginning of time, from darkness into light, and explore the balance of the powerful forces still at play in the world today.

The art has been created by two old friends; John Moriarty of Ngati Toa Rangatira and Ngai Tahu iwi and Gavin Reedy of Ngati Porou, who have a relationship of nearly 40 years.

Together, they have brought to life key concepts and ideas from Orokohanga; which itself is a cornerstone of the Māori worldview.

The exhibit, which includes Gavin's Sculptures carved from wood that has washed up in Te Whanganui a Tara, (The great harbour of Tara – Wellington Harbour). The Sculptures have been carved and mounted on industrial steel bases. There will also have ceramic and native wood taonga on display.



Gavin's pieces celebrate the deeds of Tane Mahuta, Tangaroa and their brothers and the mana that comes with being Māori. He is inspired by Te Orokohanga o te Ao Māori, as the genesis of the Māori worldview.

Gavin has been involved in several art and poetry exhibitions but this is his first sculpture exhibition.

John's work centres on Tiki, as the first man. John's perspective is that Tiki should be celebrated just as we celebrate Hineahuone as the first woman. He says we need the male essence to balance our culture. John works in several media, clay being his mainstay at the moment and he has taught himself the art of moulding again using Tiki as the subject. He will also have heru (hair combs to adorn the hair) carved from native wood, and these stunning pieces are always in high demand.

John and Gavin's work convey their belief that since the separation of Sky Father and Earth Mother and the birth of the Atua (gods) Maori there has always been conflict. However, this conflict is balanced out with aroha, (love and concern) manaakitanga (kindness and respect) and whanaungatanga (relationships, kinships, family).

Just to whet your appetite—Here are a few examples of the work on show.

Remembering Kingsford Smith

An exhibition by the Horowhenua Philatelic Society - our local Stamp Club.

28th September 2018 marks the 90th Anniversary of the first crossing of the Tasman Sea by air, a significant event in New Zealand's history.

Charles Kingsford Smith piloted the plane, "Southern Cross," with 3 other crew from Sydney to Christchurch, a flight of nearly 14 ½ hours.



He went on to pioneer many other routes in his career and left a lasting legacy on both sides of the Tasman.

This display shows some of the stamps and covers that detail his achievements as well as other memorabilia associated with Kingsford-Smith.

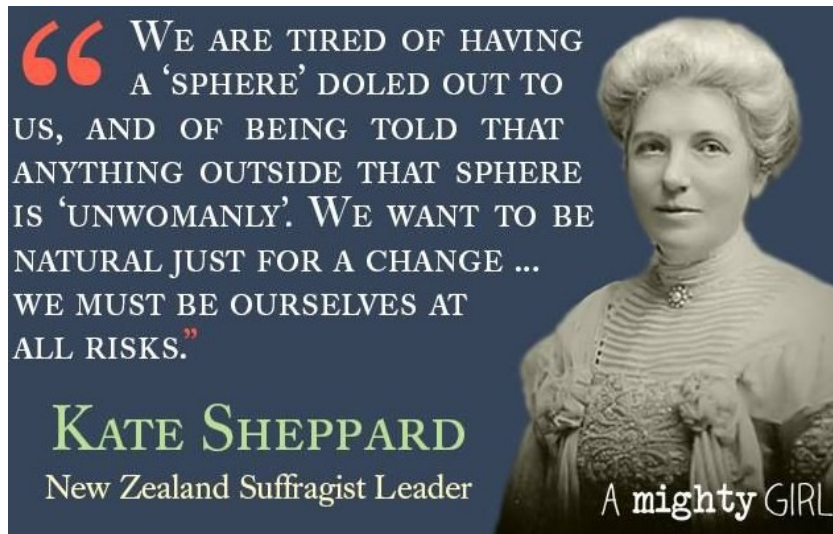
