Once again the art in the display area of Te Takere is beautiful— We are so lucky to have so many talented artists in our region who are willing to share their work with us




This month we have been privileged to see the work of **Angela McMeekin** who began painting in 2000 after attending a watercolour workshop while living in Te Anau.

Karen has transitioned the old traditional Wellington Zoo into a leading player in conservation and innovative animal welfare. She has succeeded in what was a traditional male role and in the year we celebrate Suffrage 125 we ask if there has been real change.



'And the Juice of a Lemon'


This short novel weaves together the story of a contract writer and the manuscript of young adult novel he has been hired to finish.

Remember When...

50 years ago library books had cards and date sheets in the back? The librarian used to write your card number on the book card and stamp the back of the book with a heavy stamp with the due date. Those book cards were then all filed in numerical order each day so that it was possible to replace them in each book when it was returned. Time consuming, laborious and not always 100% accurate.

Once computers were introduced into libraries and library catalogues were databases instead of large wooden filing cabinets which held several cards with carefully planned access points for each book in the collection, staff had hand held scanners to read bar codes on books and cards.

Books still had date stamps in them with return dates.



Then came the Self issue machines and the interaction between staff and library users changed – not so much time to chat over the issue desk. The function of the library as just a place to get your reading material has morphed into a place where much more happens. Our libraries are now true community centres where almost anything can happen. Safe spaces to relax and meet friends, where you don't have to spend huge amounts of cash to enjoy yourself and places where you can get information on almost any subject as well as your recreational reading.

The new Self Issue machines are great – easy to use and they can even give you suggestions of further items that you may be interested in. Do take the time to explore their possibilities. I often read e-books, but I still prefer the paper variety. I hope they never disappear – I wonder what we will be reading 50 years from now.

But please – don't forget your library staff – they are still there to help you, willing to chat and advise on where and how to find what you are looking for if you need help. And everyone loves a friendly smile and greeting whatever they are doing!

Remembering Kingsford Smith

An exhibition by the Horowhenua Philatelic Society - our local Stamp Club.

28th September 2018 marks the 90th Anniversary of the first crossing of the Tasman Sea by air, a significant event in New Zealand's history.

Charles Kingsford Smith piloted the plane, "Southern Cross," with 3 other crew from Sydney to Christchurch, a flight of nearly 14 ½ hours.



He went on to pioneer many other routes in his career and left a lasting legacy on both sides of the Tasman.

This display shows some of the stamps and covers that detail his achievements as well as other memorabilia associated with Kingsford-Smith.
