I'm sure by now you will have noticed the beautiful bright new shelves on the right as you enter Te Takeretanga o Kura Hau Po. These have been sponsored by the Friends of Horowhenua library to enable the creation of a much larger popular fiction collection.



The Te Ao Maori collection has been relocated to the area near the Local History section towards the Eastern wall of the building.

The Young Adult collection has been moved downstairs—near the Information desk at the entrance and closer to the desk which will have two staff on duty at all times.

This means that some of the Non Fiction collection which has previously been downstairs is now upstairs. Remember there is a lift to get you up to the mezzanine floor if your favourite collection has been relocated up there.


If you can't find what you are looking for please ask a staff member and I'm sure they will be happy to help you.



#### Have you met Libby?



For a long time we have been able to access free ebooks from our library using the ebook platform linked to our libraries.

Now we have even more choice as Horowhenua libraries have become subscribers to Libby, a free app which is compatible with IOS and Android devices. Libby even has a font designed to make determining letters easier for dyslexic readers. You can change the font and the background colour to suit your preferences which makes reading on an IPad or similar device much more comfortable. I personally prefer a pale sepia toned background screen which is easy on the eyes.

Just download the FREE app onto your iPad and away you go. You should be able to use your current library password but if you have any problems just have a chat with our lovely library staff. They are happy to help.

When I did a quick check today there were over 13,000 available Fiction titles to choose from! And of course there is a huge non fiction collection too.

And did I say there were also Audio books? Great for listening to on a long road trip, lazing at the beach or even while doing the ironing (if you still do!).

The old library ebook platform still works too—so we have double the fun!

We are so lucky to have such forward thinking library staff.

## Read to your Baby—or Grandbaby

In an interesting article in the **Dominion Post Education section on Saturday November** 23 last year, **Brittany Keogh** reported on work done by researchers at the University of Auckland and the University of Otago who have been analysing data from the long running **Growing up in New Zealand** Study of 6000 children.

They found children whose parents had been proactive about reading and counting with them and encouraging them to start writing were better at recognising and forming letters at 4 1/2/yrs old than those whose parents did not read with them.

Dr Kane Meissel said that the findings showed the importance of Parents as first teachers. Children who have been exposed to books and have been read to have a broader view of the world because they learn to think about things outside their home environment.

In a world where children are increasingly using digital devices it is important they read print books which appear to have a positive impact on their learning.

Ministry of Education deputy secretary of early learning and student achievement, Ellen MacGregor-Reid said that the Ministry encouraged whanau to read to tamariki early and often.
