#### The Last Train to London

by Meg Waite Clayton


This novel stayed with me long after the last page.

It tells the story of the escape of thousands of children from Nazi occupied Europe in the wars leading up to the Second World War..

Truss Wisjmuller was a member of the Dutch resistance who risked her life smuggling thousands of children out of Nazi Germany and into other European countries who were willing to give them refuge. After the annexation of Austria by Hitler this became even more dangerous and Tante Truus, as she was known to the children hatched a plan to send them tout of Europe to England by train.

Although this story is told as a novel it is based on the exploits of a remarkable woman.

Definitely worth reading.



**Geertruida Wijsmuller-Meijer** (21 April 1896, <u>Alkmaar</u> – 30 August 1978, <u>Amsterdam</u>) was a <u>Dutch resistance fighter</u> who brought <u>Jewish</u> children and adults into safety before and during the <u>Second World War</u>. Together with other people involved in the prewar <u>Kindertransport</u>, she saved the lives of more than 10,000 Jewish children, fleeing anti-Semitism. She was honored as <u>Righteous among the Nations</u> by <u>Yad Vashem</u>. After the war she served on the Amsterdam city council. Our Voices Horowhenua – Twenty Women's Stories, by Shepherdess Magazine.

Our Voices set out to uncover the personal voice of women living in the Horowhenua. In these stories, women share what is important to them, the trials they have been through, and where they have found hope and fulfilment. Each story is unique, but they are all connected by a common thread – finding a sense of belonging in the Horowhenua.

Shepherdess held several writing workshops in 2020, bringing women from across the district together for an evening of camaraderie and exploration of the written word.

Shepherdess writer, Carly Thomas, worked with each of the women over a few months to put their experiences on paper and give some insight into what has led them to where they are today. Photographer, Helen Lea Wall, then captured each woman in a place that was meaningful to them and their story.

The result is an exhibition full of power and narrative, sharing the voices of Horowhenua women.
